

§3 Dodd Premice

Def Let $N = \langle J_\nu^E, F \rangle$ be an active ppm.
 $D(N) = D_N =$ the set of limit cardinals
 in N s.t. $\lambda_\mu \in (\kappa_N, \delta)$ $\wedge \mu \leq \delta$ in N ,
 (Here $o(\mu) =$ the least upper bound
 of the ν s.t. $E_\nu \neq \emptyset$ s.t. $(E_\nu \mid = \mu)$)
 It is easily seen that $D_N \subset \lambda_N + 1$ is
 closed in $\lambda_N + 1$. Moreover, $D_N \neq \emptyset$
 since e.g. $\kappa^{\text{cof } N} \in D_N$.

Following §2 we then set:

Def $d_N = \begin{cases} \min \{ \delta \in D_N \mid \delta \geq \lambda_N \} & \text{if such} \\ & \delta \text{ exists;} \\ \lambda_N & \text{if not.} \end{cases}$

The class of D-premice is defined exactly as in §2. As usual we set:

$$D(\nu)_M = D_\nu^M = D_{M \parallel \nu} \quad \text{for } E_\nu^M \neq \emptyset$$

$$d(\nu)_M = d_\nu^M = d_{M \parallel \nu} \quad \text{"}$$

At present, however, we are interested
 in a subclass of the D-premice
 which we shall call d-premice
 or Dodd premice. We call them
 that because they are, in fact,
 based on ideas of Tony Dodd.

They are also related to Ralf Schindler's "mice below 0-handgrenade" and we shall make use of Schindler's methods.

Def Let M be a D -premouse. M is a d -premouse iff

(a) $d_{\nu}^M \in D_{\nu}^M$ whenever $E_{\nu}^M \neq \emptyset$

(b) Let $E_{\nu}^M \neq \emptyset$, $N = M \parallel \nu$. Let α be a limit cardinal in N s.t. $\alpha^{+N} \leq \aleph_N$. There is $\mu \in (\alpha, \alpha^{+N})$ s.t. $E_{\mu}^N \neq \emptyset$ and $\text{crit}(E_{\mu}^N) = \alpha_N$.

Note (a) is a strong restriction on the D -premouse, (b) restricts the class of premice but should not restrict the resulting class of mice, since it follows from the condensation lemmas (e.g. Lemma 4' in §IV of [CR]).

Following §2 we define:

Def Let N be an active ppm.

$$\tilde{C}_N = \{ \bar{\alpha} < d_N \mid \bar{\alpha} = d_{N_{\bar{\alpha}}} \}$$

$$C_N = \{ \bar{\alpha} \in \tilde{C}_N \mid N_{\bar{\alpha}} \text{ satisfies } D\text{-MIS} \}$$

Since d_N is always a limit cardinal in N for d -premouse N we have by §2 Cor 2.4;

Lemma 1 Let N be an active d -premouse.

Then $\tilde{C}_N = C_N = \{ \xi \in \tilde{C}_N \mid N_\xi \in N \}$

We of course set:

$$\tilde{C}_\nu^m = \tilde{C}_\nu^m = \tilde{C}_{M \parallel \nu} \text{ for } E_\nu^m = \emptyset$$

(similarly for $C(\nu)$).

The most important theorem on D -iteration of Dodd premice is:

Lemma 2 Let \mathcal{Y} be a normal D -iteration of M , where M is a d -premouse. Then if $i < j$, $d_{i,j} \in D$, then $\kappa_j \notin (u_i, d_i)$.

pf. Suppose not

let $\mathcal{Y} = \langle \langle M_i \rangle, \langle \nu_i \mid i \in \mathcal{D} \rangle, \langle \gamma_i \rangle, \langle \kappa_i \rangle, \tau \rangle$ be a counterexample of minimal length θ .

We suppose w.l.o.g. that \mathcal{Y} is direct (i.e. $D = \emptyset$). Clearly $\theta = j+1$ where $j > i$ and $\kappa_j \in (u_i, d_i)$

[Recall that by the conventions of § 2, $d_i =_{nt} d_{\nu_i}^{m_i}$, $d_i^+ =_{nt} d_{\nu_i}^{+m_i}$.]

Then:

(1) $\neg \text{Lim}(j)$

If not there is $h+1 \leq j$ s.t. j is simple above $h+1$ and $T(h+1) > i$. Then

$\text{crit}(\pi_{h+1, j}^-) = \kappa_h$ where $\kappa_h \geq d_i > \kappa_j$ and

$\kappa_j = \pi_{h+1, j}^-(\bar{v})$ for some $\bar{v} \leq \text{ht}(M_{h+1})$.

Then $\kappa_j = \text{crit}(E_{\bar{v}}^{M_{h+1}})$. Define a new iteration y' of length $h+2$ by setting: $y'|_{h+1} = y|_{h+1}$, $v'_{h+1} = \bar{v}$. Then y' is a counterexample of smaller length.

Contr!

QED (1)

Thus:

(2) $j = h+1$ where $h \geq i$.

(3) $\kappa_h > \kappa_j$, since otherwise

$\kappa_j \geq \kappa_h > d_h \geq d_j$. Hence!

(4) $\kappa_h \geq d_i$,

since otherwise $\kappa_h \leq \kappa_i$ by the minimality of j . Hence $\kappa_h < \kappa_j$. Contr!

Now let $\bar{z} = T(j)$. Then $\bar{z} \leq h$ and $d_i \leq \kappa_h < d_{\bar{z}}$. Hence $i < \bar{z}$. Note

that

(5) $v_j = \text{ht}(M_j)$,

since otherwise there is $\mu \in (d_i, d_i^+)$ with $E_{\mu} \neq \emptyset$ & $\text{crit}(E_{\mu}) = \kappa_j$ in M_j , hence in M_i as well, since $\bigcup_{d^+}^{E^{M_i}} = \bigcup_{d^+}^{E^{M_j}}$.

Hence $0(u_i) > d_i$ in $M_i \parallel v_i$, where $u_i < u_j < d_i$. Contr! QED (5)

But then, $\pi_{\bar{z}}(v') = v_j$ where $v' \in \text{ht}(M_h^+)$. Hence $u_j = \text{crit}(E_{v'}^{M_h})$. Define an iteration γ' of length $\bar{z} + z$ as follows: $\gamma' \upharpoonright (\bar{z} + 1) = \gamma \upharpoonright (\bar{z} + 1)$, $v_{\bar{z}}' = v'$. Then γ' is shorter than γ but $u_{\bar{z}}' = u_j \in (u_i, d_i)$, where $i < \bar{z}$. Contr! QED (Lemma 2)

Def $\Gamma(\gamma) =$ the set of $i < \text{lh}(\gamma)$ s.t. for all $j < \text{lh}(\gamma)$, $i \leq j \rightarrow i \leq_T j$ in γ .

An iteration γ is almost linear iff for all limit $\lambda \leq \text{lh}(\gamma)$, $\Gamma(\gamma \upharpoonright \lambda)$ is cofinal.

Fact Let γ be a d -iteration (i.e. a \square -iteration of a d -promouse). γ is almost linear iff for all $\eta < \text{lh}(\gamma)$ the set $\{i \mid T(i+1) \leq \eta \leq i\}$ is finite.

proof. (w.l.o.g. take γ as normal)
 (\rightarrow) is trivial.

(\leftarrow) Suppose not. Let $\eta < \lambda$. Let $\eta \leq i$ s.t. κ_i is minimal for $\eta \leq i < \lambda$. Then $T(i+1) \leq \eta$ and there at most finitely many j with $\kappa_j = \kappa_i$, $j < \lambda$. Let j be a maximal such. Then $u_h \geq d_j$ for $h > j$. Hence $i \leq_T h$ for $h > j$. QED

Thus, if \mathcal{Y} is almost linear and of limit length, then \mathcal{Y} composes into a sequence of successive iterations whose initial points are the models N_i ($i \in \Gamma(\mathcal{Y})$). \mathcal{Y} then has the unique cofinal branch $b = \{i \mid \forall i \in \Gamma(\mathcal{Y}) i \leq_{\Gamma} i\}$.

As an immediate consequence of Lemma 2 we get:

Lemma 3 Let \mathcal{Y} be a putative normal d -iteration of N of length $k+1$. Then \mathcal{Y} is almost linear.

[Note Following Steel, we call \mathcal{Y} a putative iteration if it is like an iteration except that the final model, if there is one, may not be well founded, although it is formed according to the iteration rules. We still take its well founded core as being transitive.]

[Note We shall write " d -iteration" to mean a D -iteration of a d -premouse.]

proof of Lemma 3.

Suppose not. Let $X = \{i \mid T(i+1) \leq \gamma < i\}$ be infinite. Let $\langle i_m \mid m < \omega \rangle$ enumerate the first ω elements of X . Then if $i_m < i < i_{m+1}$ we must have $T(i+1) \geq i_{m+1}$, since otherwise $\kappa_i < t_{i_m}$ and $\kappa_i \notin (\kappa_{i_m}, t_{i_m})$. Hence $\kappa_i \leq \kappa_{i_m} < t_\gamma$ and $T(i+1) \leq \gamma$. Contr! Thus $i_{m+1} \leq_T i$ for $i_m < i \leq i_{m+1}$. In particular, if $\gamma < h \leq i_m$, then $h \not\leq_T i$ for $i_m < i \leq i_{m+1}$, since $T(i_{m+1}) \leq \gamma$. Now let b be a cofinal branch in $\lambda = \sup_m i_m$. For sufficiently large $j \in b$ there is m_j s.t. $i_{m_j} < j \leq i_{m_j+1}$. Pick j, j' s.t. $m_j < m_{j'}$. Then $j \not\leq_T j'$. Contr! QED (Lemma 3)

Thus, if a normal δ -iteration of limit length has any cofinal branch at all, it is almost linear and, therefore, has a unique cofinal branch.

Since the property of not having any cofinal branch is absolute in ZF-model it follows by a Löwenheim-Skolem argument that:

Corollary 3.1 Let N be a d -premouse.

Assume that whenever $\sigma: Q \xrightarrow{\sum_w} N$ and Q is a countable d -premouse, then Q is countably normally d -iterable. Then N is normally d -iterable.

(Clearly the same holds with "d-iterable" in place of "normally d-iterable".)

A d -wearl is of course a structure $W = J_{\infty}^E$ s.t. each $W \parallel \beta = \langle J_{\beta}^E, E_{W\beta} \rangle$ is a d -mouse (i.e. a d -iterable premouse).

We shall construct a d -wearl K^d which is universal wrt. d -mice and in which many large cardinal properties of V are preserved (i.e. if κ is strong in V , then it is strong in K^d). We construct K^d as the limit of a Steel-type array. The construction will be very much like Ralf Schindler's construction of a universal wearl for his "mice below 0-handgrenade". As in his case we get by with a very weak "background condition" for adding an extender to the array. Schindler requires only that the extender be ω -complete. This

enables him to prove that each N_i in the array is normally iterable, but not that it is fully iterable. Normal iterability suffices for many purposes. Schindler's construction would yield full iterability if we modified it to require that each new extender in the array be strongly ω -complete in the following sense:

Def Let F be an extender at κ, λ . F is strongly ω -complete iff whenever U is countable, then there is $g: U \cap \lambda \rightarrow \kappa$ s.t. whenever $h \in U$ s.t. $h: \mathbb{Z} \rightarrow \mathcal{P}(\kappa) \cap \text{dom}(F)$ for a $\mathbb{Z} \subset U$, $X \in \text{rng}(h)$, and $d_1, \dots, d_m < \lambda$, then $\langle g(d_1), \dots, g(d_m) \rangle \in X \iff \langle d_1, \dots, d_m \rangle \in F(X)$.

In the present paper we shall follow Schindler in requiring only ω -completeness and proving only normal iterability. For the reader this has the advantage of avoiding some technical detail. We are convinced - but have not yet fully checked - that a construction using strong ω -completeness

will yield an array of fully iterable mice.

We define an array as follows:

N_0 and N_λ for $\text{Lim}(\lambda)$ are defined as usual.

Now let N_i be defined. If N_i is not weakly normally iterable, then N_{i+1} is undefined.

Now suppose that N_i is weakly normally iterable. (This is enough to prove solidarity and the condensation lemmas.) Let $M_i =$

$\text{core}(N_i) = \langle J_\alpha^E, E_{w_\alpha} \rangle$. If $E_{w_\alpha} = \emptyset$ and there

exists a d -premouse $N = \langle J_\beta^E, F \rangle$ s.t. $F \neq \emptyset$ is ω -complete and $\alpha = d_N$, $J_\alpha^{E'} = J_\alpha^E$, set:

$N_{i+1} = N$ for such an N . Otherwise set:

$N_{i+1} = \langle J_{d+1}^E, \emptyset \rangle$. This completes the definition.

We claim that N_ω is defined. Suppose not. Then there is i s.t. N_i is defined and N_{i+1} not.

Hence N_i is ^{not} weakly normally iterable.

We derive a contradiction by showing that if $\sigma: Q \rightarrow_{\Sigma_\omega} N_i$, then Q is countably normally iterable. At, in fact, suffices to assume that σ is Σ^* -preserving and fine in the following sense:

Def Let $\sigma: Q \rightarrow_{\Sigma_\omega} N$, where Q, N are d -premice. σ is fine iff $\sigma(d_Q^+) \leq d_N^+$ in the case that Q, N are active.

(Note Fineness guarantees that if ν is applicable in Q , then $\sigma(\nu)$ is applicable in N .)

Choosing N_i , if possible, to be of type B.

Def Let $\delta: Q \rightarrow \sum^* N_\delta$ ^{be fine}. Let \mathcal{Y} be a putative normal d -iteration of Q . \mathcal{Y} is realizable wrt. δ iff

(a) If \mathcal{Y} is of length $k+1$, then there is a fine $\delta': Q_k \rightarrow N_{\delta'}$, where

- $\delta' = \delta$ and $\delta' \upharpoonright_{\kappa_k} = \delta$ if i is simple in \mathcal{Y}
- $\delta' < \delta$ if i is not simple in \mathcal{Y}
- δ' is $\Sigma_0^{(m)}$ -preserving whenever

$$\text{lub}_{i < k} \kappa_i \leq \text{wp}_{Q_k}^m$$

(b) If \mathcal{Y} is of limit length λ , then \mathcal{Y} has a putative extension of length $\lambda+1$ which is realizable in the sense of (a).

Def If (a) holds, we say that (δ, δ') is a realization of \mathcal{Y} wrt δ .

Lemma 4 N_∞ is defined.

proof.

It suffices to show that N_δ is weakly normally iterable whenever $\delta < \infty$ is defined. Hence it suffices to show:

Lemma 4.1 Let N_δ be defined, $\delta < \infty$. Let Q be a d -premouse and let $\delta: Q \rightarrow \sum^* N_\delta$, where Q is countable and \mathcal{Y} is a countable normal putative d -iteration of Q . Then \mathcal{Y} is realizable wrt. δ .

proof of Lemma 4.1 (w.l.o.g. \mathcal{Y} is direct)

We first construct a sequence $\langle \delta_i, \gamma_i \rangle$ ($i < \text{lh}(\mathcal{Y})$) s.t.

(a) $\langle \delta_i, \gamma_i \rangle$ is a realization of $\mathcal{Y}|_{i+1}$ w.t. δ

(b) If $i \leq_T i$ and i is simple above j , then

$$\delta_i = \delta_j \text{ and } \delta_i \pi_{j,i} = \delta_j.$$

We note that if $h = T(i+1)$ and $\gamma < \text{ht}(Q_h)$,

(hence $Q_i^* \neq Q_h$), then γ is the least $\beta \geq \nu_h$ s.t. $\omega_{Q_h \parallel \beta}^w < \tau_i$. It follows easily, using the notation of the "resurrection sequence" in § 2, that

$\gamma_i = \bar{\beta}_m(Q_h, \nu_h)$ for some $m > 0$. Setting

$$\delta'_i = \gamma_m [\delta_h, \delta_h(\nu_h)], \text{ we then have:}$$

$$\sigma^{(m)} \delta_h : Q_i^* \rightarrow \sum^* N_{\gamma'_i}, \text{ where}$$

$$\sigma^{(m)} = \sigma^{(m)} [\delta_h, \delta(\nu_h)]. \text{ This suggests}$$

the following clause:

(c) If $i = j+1$, $\gamma_i = \bar{\beta}_m(Q_h, \nu_h)$, then

$$\delta_i = \gamma_m [\delta_h, \delta_h(\nu_h)] \text{ and } \delta_i \pi_{h,i} = \sigma^{(m)} \delta_h$$

$$\text{where } \sigma^{(m)} = \sigma^{(m)} [\delta_h, \delta_h(\nu_h)].$$

Note If $m = 0$, this gives us no more information than was contained in (b)

We shall construct $\langle \delta_i, \gamma_i \rangle$ inductively verifying (a)-(c) at each stage.

We first note a consequence of (a)-(c):

(1) Let $h \leq_T i$. Let $h = T(i+1)$, $i+1 \leq_T i$.
 Let $\sigma^{(m)}$ be as in (c) (i.e. $\delta_{i+1} = \sigma^{(m)} \delta_h$). Let $\kappa = \kappa_j = \text{crit}(\pi_{hi}^{-1})$.
 Then $\delta_i(\kappa) < \sigma^{(m)} \delta_h(\kappa)$, $\delta_i \upharpoonright \kappa = \sigma^{(m)} \delta_h \upharpoonright \kappa$,
 and $\delta_i(X) = \delta_i(\kappa) \cap \sigma^{(m)} \delta_h(X)$ for
 all $X \in \#(\kappa) \cap Q_i$.

proof. Suppose not.

Let i be the least counterexample.

By (b) we have $i = l+1$ where

$\eta_l < Q_{T(i)}$. Let $k = T(i)$. If $k > h$

then d_h^+ is a cardinal in Q_k and $\bar{\tau} = \bar{\tau}_j$
 is a cardinal in $\bigcup_{E \in Q_h} d_h^+ = \bigcup_{E \in Q_k} d_h^+$. Hence
 $\bar{\tau}$ is a cardinal in Q_k , where

$$\delta_i = \tilde{\sigma} \delta_k, \quad \tilde{\sigma} = \sigma^{(m)} [\delta_k, \delta_k(\nu_k)]$$

for some m . By Fact 6 about
 arrays in § 2, $\tilde{\sigma} \upharpoonright \bar{\tau} = \text{id}$. Hence

$\delta_i \upharpoonright \bar{\tau} = \delta_k \upharpoonright \bar{\tau}$ and $k < i$ must be
 a counterexample. Contr! Thus

$k = h$. But then $\delta_i(\kappa) < \delta_i(\lambda_j) =$

$$= \delta_i \pi_{hi}^{-1}(\kappa) = \sigma^{(m)} \delta_h(\kappa). \text{ Moreover,}$$

$$\delta_i \upharpoonright \kappa = \delta_i \pi_{hi}^{-1} \upharpoonright \kappa = \sigma^{(m)} \delta_h \upharpoonright \kappa.$$

At $X \subset u$, then $d_i(x) = d_i(u \cap \bar{a}_{h_i}(x)) =$
 $= d_i(u) \cap \sigma^{(i)} d_h(x)$. QED (1)

and ν is applicable in N_γ

We also note the following fact:

Lemma 4.1.1 Let $E_\nu^{N_\gamma} \neq \emptyset$ w.t. τ_ν is a cardinal in N_γ . Then $E_\nu^{N_\gamma}$ is ω -complete. proof.

Let U be countable. We claim that there is $g: U \cap \lambda_\nu \rightarrow \kappa_\nu$ which verifies ω -completeness w.t. U in the following sense: At $d_1, \dots, d_m < \lambda_\nu$, $X \in \mathcal{F}(u) \cap U \cap N_\gamma$ then $\langle g(\vec{d}) \rangle \in X \iff \langle \vec{d} \rangle \in E_\nu^{N_\gamma}(X)$.

Set: $\gamma^* = \gamma^*[\gamma, \nu]$, $\sigma^* = \sigma^*[\gamma, \nu]$.

Then $\sigma^*: N_\gamma \parallel \nu \xrightarrow{\Sigma^*} N_{\gamma^*}$ and the top extender F^* of N_{γ^*} is ω -complete. Let $g^*: \sigma^*(U \cap \lambda_\nu) \rightarrow \kappa_\nu$ verify the ω -completeness of F^* w.t.

$U^* = (U \cap \mathcal{F}(\kappa_\nu)) \cup \sigma^*(U \cap \lambda_\nu)$. Note that $\sigma^*(\tau_\nu + 1) = id$ by Fact 8 of §2, since τ_ν is a cardinal in N_γ . Hence $g(\alpha) = g^* \sigma^*(\alpha)$ verifies the ω -completeness of $E_\nu^{N_\gamma}$ w.t. U .

QED (4.4.1)

We now define δ_i by induction on i .

Case 1 $i=0$. Set: $\delta_0 = \delta$

Case 2 $i=j+1$.

Let $h = T(i)$. For $h \leq l < j$ we have $\kappa_l \geq \kappa_j$, since otherwise $\kappa_l < \kappa_j < d_l$. Hence $T(l+1) \geq h$. Hence $h \leq_T l$ for $h \leq l \leq j$.

Case 1 $h=j$

Let $\gamma_h = \bar{\beta}_m(Q_h, \nu_h)$. Following (c) we set:
 $\delta_i = \gamma_h [\delta_h, \delta_h(\nu_h)]$, $\sigma^{(m)} = \sigma^{(m)}[\delta_h, \delta_h(\nu_h)]$

Then $\sigma^{(m)}\delta_h : Q_h^* \rightarrow N_{\gamma_i}$. \bar{z}_h is a cardinal in Q_h^* . Hence $\sigma^{(m)}\delta_h(\bar{z}_h)$ is a cardinal in N_{γ_i} . Hence $F^* = E_{N_{\gamma_i}}^{\sigma^{(m)}\delta_h(\nu_h)}$ is ω -complete. Hence there is

$g : \lambda_h \rightarrow \sigma^{(m)}\delta_h(\kappa_h)$ s.t. whenever $\alpha_1, \dots, \alpha_n < \lambda_h$ and $X \in \mathcal{P}(\kappa_h) \cap Q_h^*$, then: $\langle g(\vec{\alpha}) \rangle \in \sigma^{(m)}\delta_h(X) \iff \langle \vec{\alpha} \rangle \in F(X)$, where $F = E_{\nu_h}^{Q_h}$. (This is because $\sigma^{(m)}\delta_h(F(X)) = F^*(\sigma^{(m)}\delta_h(X))$.)

Note that $\sigma^{(m)}\delta_h : Q_h^* \rightarrow N_{\gamma_i}$ is $\Sigma_0^{(m)}$ -preserving whenever $\kappa_h < \omega_p^m_{Q_h^*}$.

(If $m > 0$, then $\sigma^{(m)}\delta_h$ is Σ^* -preserving,
 If not, then $\sigma^{(m)}$ is Σ^* -preserving and
 δ_h is $\Sigma_0^{(m)}$ -preserving whenever $\kappa_l \leq \omega \rho^m$
 for all $l \leq h$.) Let φ be a $\Sigma_0^{(m)}$ -
 -formula and let $\alpha_1, \dots, \alpha_m < \lambda_h$,
 $f_1, \dots, f_m \in \Gamma^*(\kappa_h, Q_h^*)$. Then

$$Q_i \models \varphi[\pi_{hi}(\vec{f})(\vec{\alpha})] \iff \langle \vec{\alpha} \rangle \in F(X)$$

$$\text{where } X = \{ \langle \vec{\beta} \rangle \mid Q_h^* \models \varphi[\vec{f}(\vec{\beta})] \}$$

$$\iff \langle g(\vec{\alpha}) \rangle \in \sigma^{(m)}\delta_h(X)$$

$$\iff N_{\mathcal{Y}_i} \models \varphi[\sigma^{(m)}\delta_h(\vec{f})(g(\vec{\alpha}))],$$

Hence by setting:

$$\delta_i(\pi_{hi}(f)(\alpha)) = \sigma^{(m)}\delta_h(f)(g(\alpha))$$

we get a map $\delta_i: Q_i \rightarrow N_{\mathcal{Y}_i}$ with the
 right preservation properties.

$$\text{Moreover, } \delta_i \pi_{hi} = \sigma^{(m)}\delta_h.$$

Case 2 $h \leq i$

We again set: $\sigma^{(m)} = \sigma^{(m)}[\delta_h, \delta_h(\nu_h)]$,

$\delta_i = \gamma_m[\delta_h, \delta_h(\nu_h)]$, where $\gamma_i = \beta_m(Q_h, \nu_h)$.

Using (1) we prove:

Claim $\delta_i(\kappa_i) \leq \sigma^{(m)}\delta_h(\kappa_i)$,

$$\delta_i \upharpoonright \kappa_i = \sigma^{(m)}\delta_h \upharpoonright \kappa_i, \text{ and}$$

$$\eta_l = \bar{\beta}_{m+m}(\mathcal{Q}_h, \nu_h). \text{ Set:}$$

$$\sigma^{(m+m)} = \sigma^{(m+m)}[\delta_h, \delta_h(\nu_h)]. \text{ Then}$$

$$\sigma^{(m+m)} = \sigma' \sigma^{(m)} \text{ where } \sigma' =$$

$$= \sigma^{(m)}[\delta_i, \sigma^{(m)}\delta_h(\nu_h)]. \text{ Since } \bar{\tau}_i \text{ is}$$

a cardinal in \mathcal{Q}_i^* and $\sigma^{(m)}\delta_h: \mathcal{Q}_i^* \rightarrow N_{\delta_i}$,

$\sigma^{(m)}\delta_h(\bar{\tau}_i)$ is a cardinal in N_{δ_i} and

hence $\sigma' \upharpoonright \sigma^{(m)}\delta_h(\bar{\tau}_i) = \text{id}$ by § 2 Fact 8.

The conclusion follows easily by (1)

(applied to κ_l , $\sigma^{(m+m)}\delta_h$ in place κ_i , $\sigma^{(m)}\delta_h$) and the fact that $\kappa_i \leq \kappa_l$.

for $X \in \mathcal{K}(\kappa_i) \cap Q_i = \mathcal{K}(\kappa_i) \cap Q_i^*$. By the ω -completeness of F^* there is $g: \lambda_i \rightarrow \delta_i(\kappa_i)$ s.t. whenever $\alpha_1, \dots, \alpha_n < \lambda_i$ and $X \in \mathcal{K}(\kappa_i) \cap Q_i$, then:

$= M_\delta$ for a $\delta < \beta$. Hence $N_{\gamma+1} = N_{\delta+1}$.

Contr! Since $V_\beta \prec W$, we can carry out the same proof in W to get:

$N_\beta = N_\beta^W = \aleph_W^d \parallel \beta$. QED (Lemma 7.1)

Lemma 7.2 Let κ be E -strong. Then $o(\kappa) = \infty$ in K^d . (Hence κ is E -strong in K^d .)

proof. Suppose not.

Let $o(\kappa) < \beta < \gamma$ s.t. $V_\beta \underset{\Sigma_2}{\prec} V_\gamma \underset{\Sigma_2}{\prec} V$.

As before, β is a limit cardinal and $N_\beta = \langle J_\beta^E, \phi \rangle = K^d \parallel \beta$. Similarly for γ ,

let F^* be an extender at κ which is γ -strong. Let

$$\pi : \langle V, E \rangle \xrightarrow{F^*} \langle W, \bar{E} \rangle.$$

Claim There is no $\mu \in (\kappa, \beta)$ s.t. $o(\mu) > \beta$ in K^d .

Set $F = (F^* \upharpoonright \beta) \upharpoonright N_\beta$. Let

$$\pi' : J_{\bar{E}}^E \xrightarrow{F} J_{\downarrow}^{E'} \quad \text{where } \bar{E} = \kappa^+ K^d$$

There is $\sigma : J_{\downarrow}^{E'} \xrightarrow{\Sigma_0} \pi(N_\beta)$ defined

by $\sigma(\pi'(f)(\alpha)) = \pi(f)(\alpha)$ ($\alpha < \beta$). Then

$\sigma \upharpoonright \beta = \text{id}$. Set $F' = \pi' \upharpoonright \beta(\kappa)$. Then

$\mathcal{Q} = \langle J_{\downarrow}^{E'}, F' \rangle$ is a ppm and $\langle J_{\downarrow}^{E'}, \phi \rangle$

is a d -premouse. Clearly $\kappa_{\mathcal{Q}} \leq \beta$.

Hence $\kappa_{\mathcal{Q}} = \beta$, since β is a cardinal.

(1) Let $\tilde{\beta} = \beta^+$. Then $J_{\tilde{\beta}}^E = J_{\beta}^E$.

proof of (1).

Set $N^* = \overline{\pi(N_\beta)} = N_{\pi(\beta)}^w$, N^* internally satisfies condensation. Let $\zeta \in (\beta, \tilde{\beta})$ s.t. $\omega_{\zeta}^w = \beta$. Then $\sigma^{-1}(Q_{||\zeta}) : Q_{||\zeta} \rightarrow N^*_{||\sigma(\zeta)}$

is an element of N^* , since:

$$\sigma^{-1}(Q_{||\zeta}) : Q_{||\zeta} \xrightarrow{\omega} h_{N^*_{||\sigma(\zeta)}}^{\omega} (\beta \cup \sigma(p) \cup N_{||\zeta})$$

By condensation: $Q_{||\zeta} = N^*_{||\zeta} = K^d_{||\zeta}$, since $K^d_{||\gamma} = N^*_{||\gamma}$, $\gamma > \zeta$.

QED(1)

(2) Let $\mu \in (\alpha, \beta)$. Then $o(\mu) \leq \beta$ in Q .

proof.

Suppose not. $\langle J_v^{E^Q}, \emptyset \rangle$ is a d -premouse and $o(\mu) > \beta$ in $J_v^{E^Q}$. Hence there is

$$\bar{v} \in (\beta, \tilde{\beta}) \text{ s.t. } E_{\bar{v}}^Q \neq \emptyset, \text{crit}(E_{\bar{v}}^Q) = \mu.$$

But $Q_{||v} = K_v^d_{||v}$ by (1). Hence

$o(\mu) > \beta$ in K_v^d . Contr! QED(2)

Hence:

(3) $\beta = d_Q \in T_Q$

(4) Let $\gamma < \beta$ s.t. $\gamma = d_{Q_\gamma}$. Then

$$\forall \bar{v} \in Q_\gamma = Q_{||\bar{v}}.$$

proof.

Let γ be the least counterexample. Then for $\mu \in (\alpha, \gamma)$ we have:

$$o(\mu)_Q \in \text{rng } \sigma_\gamma^Q; \text{ hence } o(\mu)_{Q_\gamma} < \lambda_{Q_\gamma}.$$

Hence $\sup_{\mu \in (u, \gamma)} |\mu| < \lambda_{Q_\gamma}$ (since $J^E_{Q_\gamma}$ is a

ZFC - model). Hence there is $\delta \in T_{Q_\gamma}$ s.t. $\delta \geq \gamma \geq \kappa_{Q_\gamma}$. Hence $\gamma = d_{Q_\gamma} \in T_{Q_\gamma}$.

By the minimality of γ , Q_γ is a D-premouse. Since γ is a limit cardinal in Q_γ , it is a limit cardinal in \mathcal{Q} , hence in \mathcal{K}^d (since $\gamma < \beta$, $Q \upharpoonright \beta = \mathcal{K}^d \upharpoonright \beta$).

Let $\tilde{\gamma} = \gamma + \mathcal{Q}$. We can repeat the proof of (1) to show: $Q \upharpoonright \tilde{\gamma} = Q_\gamma \upharpoonright \tilde{\gamma}$. Hence $Q_\gamma \upharpoonright \tilde{\gamma} = \mathcal{K}^d \upharpoonright \tilde{\gamma}$. Set $\delta = \delta(\tilde{\gamma}, \infty)$.

Since $\tilde{\gamma}$ is cardinally absolute in \mathcal{K}^d , we conclude by the array fact in §2 that $\langle J^E_{\tilde{\gamma}}, \emptyset \rangle = N_\delta$ is a point in the array. Moreover $\mu_{i, \delta} = \mu_{i, \infty}$ for $i < \delta$. Since

$F \upharpoonright \gamma$ is ω -complete, γ is the top extender of Q_γ and Q_γ is a candidate for $N_{\delta+1}$. But Q_γ satisfies (a) in the def. of d-premouse. Hence by Lemma 6.3 it satisfies (b) as well and we conclude: $Q_\gamma = N_{\delta+1}$.

It follows exactly as in the proof of Lemma 6.3 that $Q_\gamma = \mathcal{K}^d \upharpoonright \bar{v}$ for some \bar{v} . Hence $Q_\gamma = Q \upharpoonright \bar{v}$.

It follows easily that:

(5) Q is a D -premouse.

Since $d_Q = \beta \in T_Q$, we know that Q is satisfied (a) in the def. of d -premouse. As in the proof of (4) we set:

$$\delta = \delta(\tilde{\beta}, \infty \mid (\tilde{\beta} = \beta + Q)).$$

$\langle J_{\tilde{\beta}}^E, \phi \rangle = N_\delta$, as before, and Q is a candidate for $N_{\delta+1}$. Hence, as before, Lemma 6.3 tells us that Q is a d -premouse and $Q = N_{\delta+1}$.

It follows as before that

$$Q = \mathcal{K}^d \parallel \nu \text{ for some } \nu > \beta > o(\kappa).$$

But then $E_\nu \neq \emptyset$, $\text{crit}(E_\nu) = \kappa$.

Hence $\nu < o(\kappa)$. Contr!

QED (Case 1)

Case 2 Case 1 fails.

Let ν be least s.t. $E_\nu \neq \emptyset$ and $\text{crit}(E_\nu) \in (\kappa, \beta)$. Then E_ν is ω -

-complete. Let $\pi_1: \mathcal{K}_W^d \xrightarrow{E_\nu} \mathcal{K}^*$,

(Note that $\mathcal{K}_W^d \parallel \delta = \mathcal{K}^d \parallel \delta$ and

$E_\nu = E_\nu^{\mathcal{K}_W^d}$.) Set $\pi^* = \pi_1 \pi$. Then

$$\pi^*: \mathcal{K}^d \longrightarrow \mathcal{K}^*.$$

Set: $F = (\pi^* \upharpoonright \#(u)) \upharpoonright \beta$ — i.e.,

$$F(x) = \beta \upharpoonright \pi^*(x) \text{ for } x \in \#(u) \cap K^d,$$

Then $F(x)$ is an extender on N_{β} and we set: $\pi': J_{\kappa}^E \xrightarrow{F} J_{\nu}^{E'}$ as before.

There is, as before, $\sigma: J_{\nu}^{E'} \xrightarrow{\Sigma_0} \pi^*(N_{\beta})$

defined by $\sigma(\pi'(f)(\alpha)) = \pi^*(f)(\alpha)$,

As before, $\sigma \upharpoonright \beta = \text{id}$. We again set

$F' = \pi' \upharpoonright \#(u)$. $\mathcal{Q} = \langle J_{\nu}^{E'}, F' \rangle$ is again

a ppm. We then repeat the above

proof (using $\pi^*(N_{\beta})$ instead of $\pi(N_{\beta})$)

to show that $\mathcal{Q} = K^d \parallel \nu$. The

details are left to the reader.

QED (Lemma 7.2)

We can improve these results slightly

Def " κ is strong at level d " is defined by induction.

- Every κ is strong at level 0
- Let F be an extender at κ . F is β -strong at level d iff F is β -strong and κ is strong in W at all levels $\delta < d$, where $\pi: V \xrightarrow{F} W$,
- κ is strong at level d iff for every β there is F at κ which is β -strong at level d

The notions " κ is A -strong at level d " and " κ is Σ_n -strong at level d " are defined analogously. (We leave it to the reader to devise reformulation of these definitions which can be written in the language of ZFC.)

By virtually the same proofs we then get:

Lemma 7.3 Let κ be Σ_2 -strong at level d . Then κ is E -strong at level d , where $K^d = \int_{\infty}^E$.

Lemma 7.4 Let κ be E -strong at level d , where $K^d = \int_{\infty}^E$. Then κ has this property in K^d .

The details are left to the reader.

Schindler has worked out a full core model theory for his "mice below 0 -handgrenade". We hope that this will also be possible for d -mice.
